- one-time events, conferences, festivals, concerts, workshops, or summer camps;
- research, film projects, media, or publications; or,
- startups or support for new projects in the L.A. region. (Consideration is given to organizations or projects that have been operating for at least three years).

The Dyson Foundation provides support to improve people's lives and strengthen the capacity of nonprofit organizations through the following grantmaking programs:

- The Mid-Hudson Valley Program;
- Legacy and Family Interest Program;
- Director's Discretionary Program; and,
- Support of Philanthropy.

Only the Mid-Hudson Valley Program accepts unsolicited applications.

Mid-Hudson Valley Program

The Foundation supports nonprofit organizations in the Mid-Hudson Valley of New York that impact the lives of the region's residents, most importantly those who are economically disadvantaged. The Foundation defines the Mid-Hudson region as including Columbia, Dutchess, Greene, Orange, Putnam, and Ulster counties. The Foundation has a particular emphasis on Dutchess County, its home community.

The Foundation offers project support grants to address the following needs:

- basic human needs such as food, housing, healthcare, and other human services; and,
- youth after-school and summer programs.

The Foundation makes limited funding available to Dutchess County public and independent schools, and in certain circumstances also considers funding to faith-based organizations. The Foundation considers funding to arts organizations or projects that have a demonstrated positive impact on job opportunities and the local economy, as well as arts organizations or projects providing support or training to other arts organizations.

The Foundation does not fund:

- individuals;
- private foundations;
- fiscal agents of sponsors;
- government units;
- galas, fundraising events, tickets, or sponsorships;
- direct mail campaigns;
- capital projects or campaigns;
- environmental projects;
- historic preservation;
- the environment;
- rotary clubs;
- international projects;
- debt or deficit reduction; or,
- endowments.

In addition, the Foundation's Management Assistance Program helps Mid-Hudson Valley-based nonprofits strengthen infrastructure and find greater efficiencies in administration, operations, resource development, and programming. The following programs are available:

- The Mini-Grant Program funds capacity-building projects that improve a nonprofit's administrative, governance, or programmatic functions. Mini-grants enable nonprofit board, staff, and volunteer leaders to develop new skills through specific consultant-led capacity-building activities, or through conferences, seminars, and other relevant training opportunities.
- Strategic Restructuring is the establishment of an ongoing relationship between two or more
 independent organizations to increase administrative efficiency or further programmatic missions
 through shared, transferred, or combined services, resources, or programs. This initiative provides
 funding to help organizations through this process.
- The Cash Flow Loan Program makes one year loans of up to \$50,000 against fully approved
 government contracts and foundation or corporate grants to nonprofit organizations that have
 received a Foundation grant for general operating support or project support during the last five
 years.

Note: The Foundation provides general operating support only to previous recipients of project grants.

The Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life in Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, Saint Clair, Washtenaw, and Wayne counties in southeast Michigan.

The Foundation's General Grantmaking Program provides grants in a wide range of interest areas, including, but not limited to:

- arts and culture;
- civic affairs;
- the environment;
- health:
- human services;
- neighborhood revitalization;
- community and economic development; and,
- workforce development.

In general, the Foundation does not fund ongoing operational costs, capital projects or campaigns, annual fund drives, conferences, or other one-time events through the General Grants Program

While grants to religious organizations are considered, sectarian religious programs are not eligible. Further, the Foundation does not make grants to individuals, or to cover deficits or other previously incurred obligations.

In addition, the following special grant opportunities, initiatives, and supporting organizations have their own application processes and guidelines:

- The Detroit Auto Dealers Association (DADA) Charitable Foundation Fund supports nonprofit organizations that make a lasting impact on the lives of children and youth in southeast Michigan.
- The The Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Funds support programs that reflect the personal passions of Mr. Wilson, including cancer care, Grosse Pointe community assets, and youth sports. In addition, the Ralph C. Wilson Jr. Trails Maintenance Fund supports the maintenance of already developed trails and greenways throughout the southeast Michigan region.
- The Youth Leadership Project supports programs that give young people a voice in their communities and help them gain leadership experience.
- The HOPE Fund supports projects that address issues of concern to lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender individuals and families.
- The Southfield Community Foundation Legacy Funds support the residents of Southfield and Lathrup Village.
- The Community Foundation for Livingston County supports nonprofit organizations that improve the public well-being and quality of life in Livingston County.
- The Chelsea Community Foundation supports nonprofit organizations that strengthen Chelsea and benefit its residents.
- The Corktown Area Fund supports neighborhood improvement activities in three distinct Detroit communities: Corktown, North Corktown, and Hubbard Richard.
- The Detroit Journalism Engagement Fund seeks to advance quality journalism while reflecting the perspectives of diverse constituencies, including people of color, women, and low-income communities.
- The DMC Foundation is interested in projects that promote health, wellness, or community vitality by supporting health and medical research, education, and community benefit activities relating to health outcomes; facilitating the provision of medical, healthcare, and disease-prevention services; and improving health in the community.
- The Michigan Justice Fund is committed to promoting and advancing the prosperity and dignity of Michigan residents by stemming the flow of individuals into the youth and criminal justice systems, supporting the investment of public dollars to community-driven alternatives to incarceration and detention, and ensuring those who are returning home after incarceration or detention receive the support they need to flourish.
- The Pontiac Funders Collaborative provides support in the areas of capacity building for nonprofits, collective impact, entrepreneurship, key institutions, public spaces, storytelling and communications, and workforce development.

Note: The Foundation also administers a number of scholarship programs for area residents.
